Sacred Mystery is present, personal, absent, is seeking and desires to be sought - all at the same time!

The men and woman who were our spiritual ancestors were not wrapped up in the technological world in which we are. They were middle-eastern and did not think like we do nor acquire knowledge like we do. They had two ways of experiencing and expressing the Sacred. One was "mythos" the other was "logos"

"MYTHOS"

was primary and concerned with meaning is deeply rooted in the unconscious, in the collective unconscious

requires rituals to keep them alive and active



"LOGOS"

was the rational, pragmatic and scientific thought that allowed people to function in the world

we have virtually lost the "mythos" in our time and have made "logos" the basis of our society.

The call to life, love and justice in this story is a call into life in the Spirit, not a call into a religion.

The path of contradiction and paradox is not about making God visible to us. It is about making us visible to God. We're not trying to see God in a new way. We're trying to see ourselves and our world in a new way. This is not about something you do in order to have a spiritual relationship. This is about how a spiritual relationship results when we open our eyes to see the world like God sees, when we learn to open our arms to embrace those whom God embraces.

Elevating logos to the level we have in our culture has hurt us in two significant ways. It has made people skeptical about spiritual reality and religious practice. It has led us to be preoccupied with factuality. What we want most deeply from each other is not to be fixed but to be received. Our deepest need is to be seen and heard and held, as we are, without being evaded or invaded.

An honest question is one we ask without knowing the answer to ahead of time.

An open question does not back someone into the answer we want to hear.

The Sacred is calling us from darkness into light, from bondage into freedom, from death into life - all in the here-and-now.

This business of becoming a "holy fool" is risky. It is also rewarding. Can you hear?

No matter where you go this week, no matter what happens, remember this: you carry precious cargo. So, watch your step.
